After reaching La Vetta di San Pellegrino Terme, we park in Via La Vetta near the arrival station of the San Pellegrino Terme - La Vetta funicular railway.



After parking, we set off and reach a fork in the road where the path starts on the left, but we continue along the road.



We pass the closed barrier of the private road to Sussia.



The ground has now changed, typical of an agro-sylvo-pastoral track.



We now face an uphill cemented section, with a fair incline.



We reach the first hairpin bend to the right of our route.



Along the way we also pass some depressions that allow the passage of rainwater.



In this stretch, which is always cemented, the slope increases and there are gullies that cross the entire road.



The climb continues and fatigue sets in.



At the end of the climb, we reach the Madrera Chapel and turn left.



Once past the Madrera Chapel, the ground flattens out slightly and the path is easier.



The ground is now firm with pebbles that do not impede the walk.



There are occasional information boards with benches for a short rest.



The path is now a continuous up and down and the presence of stones is greater.



Every so often there are drainage channels that channel the water towards the valley.



The terrain now improves and the walk is pleasant.



At the fork we continue to the right and the path flattens out slightly.



At the fork we continue straight ahead on the road, which starts to climb again.



In this section the ground changes colour and takes on reddish tones.



We reach the last hairpin bend on the left, now a straight stretch to our destination awaits us.



We have reached the little church of San Michele di Sussia.



After descending from the churchyard of the little church, we turn left and walk uphill.



On our right we glimpse the path to Vettarola.



Along the way, we are accompanied by the attentive gaze of grazing animals.



We look back towards the Brembana valley and continue on.



When we reach Sussia Alta we catch a glimpse of our destination behind some stones.



We have arrived at Cà Nicolett in Sussia Alta.



This house was inhabited by the mountain guide Antonio Baroni.




Antonio Baroni dedicated much of his life to exploring the peaks of the Orobic Alps.
